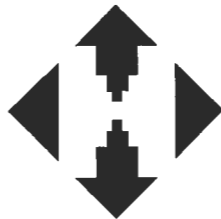

Abstract

As a part of the United Nations Transport and Communications Decade in Africa, a study was conducted that aims to improve the understanding of the pedestrians and children traffic safety problems in urban areas. The state-of-the-art in traffic safety research and practice is presented, followed by an investigation of pedestrians and children accidents in two mega cities in Africa, namely Cairo and Nairobi. Traffic safety behavior of pedestrians and school children in the two cities is measured using revealed preference questionnaires. Based on this understanding, the study has produced a future integrated safety package of remedial policies and countermeasures.

Dr. Abbas is currently a Visiting Fulbright Scholar at the Department of Civil Engineering - University of Texas at Austin. He is on leave from his work as an Assistant Professor at the Transportation Planning Department - Egyptian National Institute of Transport in Cairo, Egypt.

Abstract

This research attempts to develop a Generic Bus Transit Management System (BTMS). The BTMS contains seven subsystems namely: a vehicle maintenance management system, a vehicle operation management system, a new vehicles procurement management system, an operational cost accounting, fare determination and subsidy computation, travel demand prediction and performance evaluation.

The BTMS is composed of a user interface module and a time-based simulation model. The user interface module allows the user to input data and to develop management scenarios. A scenario is composed of the user specification of certain causal relationships between model parameters, selection of policies and specification of values for key input parameters. The simulation model contains principal dynamic feedback structural relationships. These are based on system dynamics equations, deterministic specifications, empirical formulations and stochastic representations of the different variables/parameters describing the activities/functions that constitute the management of a bus transit company.

The BTMS is meant to provide better understanding and insight into the dynamic inter-and intra-feedback relationships that exist among the various components involved in the overall management of a bus transit company. It is capable of quantifying the effects that might occur over time as a result of changes in the bus transit management practices, procedures, policies, and key input parameters. Such a system is meant to provide practical credible support to transit managers, so that they can make more rational and informed planning decisions.
